From Your Minister


Dear Church Family,

What's a Labyrinth?

You probably know it as a complicated irregular network of paths from which it is difficult to get in or out; a maze. It is also a part of your ear. In Christian tradition a labyrinth can be



symbolic of pilgrimage, using the turns and choices to replicate the path to salvation. This is a very basic (and probably erroneous!) explanation - there is much more to learn.

News recently from Russia - nominally at least a Christian country - is dispiriting to say the least. We cannot ignore 139 deaths at the terrorist attack on Crocus City Hall in Moscow (though it's difficult to say where this stands against more than 10,000 civilian deaths in Ukraine).


It's perhaps unwarranted to single out one individual, but the death at 47 of Alexei Navalny, whether assassination or accident, was a grievous loss. The treatment meted out to his friends and family has brought disgrace and infamy on Russia and especially its leader Vladimir Putin. Even so, we should as Christians disown judgement, even though that seems more difficult with every passing day. We learn that:



What made Adam capable of obeying God's commands also made him able to sin St Augustine of Hippo

It follows that since man has free will, sin will always exist. This makes the world a difficult place, one where we will always struggle and often fail to do the right thing. Jesus knew this and offered a solution. If we accept from him the gifts of bread and wine, symbolising his sacrifice on the cross, our admitted sins are forgiven. This, of course is the glory and the gift of Easter.

Dining In

Lamb and Halloumi Flatbreads ('Cyprus Pizzas')

Ideal for making a small amount of lamb stretch further, this is also very tasty and healthy, despite containing meat and olive oil.

I'm currently reading *Food for Life* by Tim Spector OBE⁵, a fascinating look at how far the science of nutrition has recently changed. We used to believe that the only bad things about ultra-processed food (UPF) were the amounts of fat, salt and sugar. If we tinkered with the formulae, it would be fine. But we have ignored the evidence that these UPFs make us feel hungrier, so we overeat and become obese and unwell. The effect on children can be extreme, and multinational companies have much to answer for.

Tim Spector tips to keep healthy include:

- Avoid snacking and allow occasional long fasting intervals
- Eat more fruit and veg; less, but higher quality, meat and fish
- Eat 30 plant varieties a week (including nuts, seed and spices)

- Support small food producers and support local shops; think about the environmental impact of your food⁶
- Opt for real food if you can and if eating convenience foods, opt for those with fewest ingredients and least processing
- Eat something fermented eg full fat yogurt daily (GOOD NEWS

 chocolate is fermented, but only the good quality dark stuff)

Onto the recipe, which serves 4

For the lamb

2 tsp vegetable oil 400g tin chopped tomatoes

1 med onion 2 tbsp tomato purée

2 garlic cloves 1 tbsp cinnamon

500g lamb mince 50g raisins or sultanas

To assemble

4 flatbreads – easy to make or you can buy 250g full fat Greek yogurt Handful of chopped mint 225g grated halloumi

For the salad

A cucumber, chopped 2 tbsp good olive oil 4 med tomatoes, chopped Juice of 1 lemon

1 small red onion, peeled and 3 tbs chopped parsley

thinly sliced

Method

- Heat a large frying pan, add oil and when hot, add the onion. Fry gently for 10 min or until soft and starting to brown.
- Add garlic, lamb, season and turn heat down to medium. Cook for 5 minutes. Add chopped tomatoes and purée continue to cook for another 3-5 minutes until the sauce has thickened.
- Remove from heat and add cinnamon and raisins.

 Arrange flatbreads on a large oven tray. Spread the yogurt over the flatbreads, followed by some mint and then the lamb mixture. Scatter over grated halloumi ad place under hot grill for 5-6 min, until the cheese is starting to brown.

Mix the salad to serve with the flatbreads.

The answers, in order, are

- a) 107. You obtain the next number in the sequence by increasing the number by the <u>sum</u> of its digits. 94+13=107
- b) 102. You obtain the next number in the sequence by increasing the last number by the <u>product</u> of its digits. 102+0=102
- c) 44. You obtain the next number in the sequence by increasing the last number by the <u>difference</u> of its digits. So the sequence will be 44 forever!


Out and About

A favourite cycle trip – if I don't have the energy to go further – is straight along the sea front to East Beach Shoeburyness. From there I can strike inland to Gt Wakering and Barling and return to Leigh via the A1159 and Priory Park. I use a short cut called Rebels' Lane, provided it's not flooded, and often wonder who the eponymous rebels were. Here is the story, which may be partly invented, but is therefore partly true.



It was called Rebels Lane because that was where some rebels hid out from the soldiers of King Richard II, following the Peasants' Revolt in about 1386. This was very much an Essex revolt, brought about by a Poll Tax in 1381 which created rebellion first in Fobbing (south of modern Basildon) then later across Essex and Kent.

After the peasants' leader Wat Tyler was killed, they fled for their lives back to where they had come from, many to Barling which was then an important seaport.



King Richard's men were out looking for rebel peasants everywhere, so the men from Barling hid in the local forest, in the area that is today called Rebels Lane. The other locals in Barling would feed them, by leaving

home made biscuits in wicker baskets at the top of what became known as Rebels Lane. One of the rebels would come out at the dead of night and collect them and take them back into the forest; hence (it is said) the expression 'taking the biscuit'.

The leader of the Barling rebels was called Jack Carr. Possibly he was known as Black Jack, the younger brother of Jack Straw the coleader of the Peasants' Revolt alongside Wat Tyler. Whatever his real name was, he died ironically by choking on a biscuit. Some three years later, the rest of the rebels lost heart, left the forest and gave themselves up to the local authorities. The rebels were surprised to be told that they were now free men and they all returned to Barling.
