#### **From Your Minister**

Dear Church Family,

The snowdrops are out! It is still rather wet and chilly but there are signs of spring. I love the hopefulness that brings.

Well, some of you experienced your first Love Feast; how did you like it? It is, of course, a tradition brought to Methodism by John Wesley for when there weren't enough ministers to preside at Holy Communion. They



would practice a Love Feast in their "classes" at home. So now you know what to do! If I am away, and there isn't a minister, our communion stewards can facilitate a Love Feast!

In this time of Lent, we are spending our time being reflective. The Methodist website has Lent resources which you can have sent to you by email from www.methodist.org.uk. On that theme I should like to reflect on the Transfiguration Sunday service I gave and what happened to me afterwards...

Transfiguration Sunday, when Jesus became bright white and was seen talking to Elijah and Moses on the top of the mountain, was a truly amazing experience for the disciples, that literally "transfigured" their worlds.



Transfigured is not a word that non-churchgoers use very often, if at all. But it happens more regularly than perhaps we realise. It is when there is a complete change of outward structure or circumstance that comes from the inside. My challenge to us all, this month, is to notice these amazing things that happen, and to see how we think God is speaking to us in those moments. What might be the event that is so beautiful, so extraordinary, so captivating that it brings us closer to God and as a result inspires us to speak God's name as we tell people about it?

When we say the word 'amazing' we quite often think 'big'. However, in the small, in the fleeting, in the tiniest of moments, something can be amazing. Last week I gave a service at Westerley Care Home and I went to speak to Sheena.

Sadly, Sheena has just come out of hospital having suffered a stroke, and hasn't been talking. I went and held her hand, and reminded her I was the new minister at Highlands. As I said this her eyes lit up and she said 'Highlands' with such clarity and a bright smile. God was with us in this moment, and it was amazing. I saw Sheena transfigured in that moment, she became for me the woman on the inside who had had a life beyond the care home, beyond the effects of a stroke; she had a sparkle in her eyes and a joy about her of happy memories.



What have we planned for March?

We have a very special service on Mother's Day (10 March - 11:00 am). We will be welcoming four new members to Highlands. Emma, Robert, Matt and Fran! This will be a wonderful celebration. So please come and support them in their promises.

#### **An Open Invitation to Memory Worship**

Wesley Methodist Church 2:00 pm 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday of the month (Next: 18 March)

You may well think to yourself: 'This is not for me. I don't have dementia.' When Rev Julia and I set up Memory Worship in 2017, we named this service 'for people with and without dementia'.

Memory Worship lasts about 30 minutes, with all the elements of a regular church service - hymns, prayers, sermon, the peace and a blessing, followed by activities, crafts and lovely cake and company. The service has a clear structure. It always includes familiar hymns, and the sermon has one clear simple message (except for some of Pastor Steve's jokes).

If you still feel 'this is not for me', please consider coming along to support someone else. Often a listening ear is the best thing you can offer someone who supports a loved one living with dementia. You could be that support at a time when that person really needed it.

No two people experience dementia in exactly the same way. What

may help one person may not do so for another. At Memory Worship, we try to provide an accepting accessible space where everyone feels held by God. After all, everyone has dark days from time to time. But nothing can extinguish God's light – the light to light our path.

#### **From the Editor**

I remember, some years back, that a friend who was sharing a story with me used the phrase: 'As fate would have it'. It is, of course, a way of saying that something inevitable or unforeseen or coincidental took place. Usually, the phrase is referring to something unfavourable, particularly if the speaker wants to avoid any responsibility. It's just bad luck. Can't be helped...

Later, I thought I'd learn a little more about 'fate'. It comes from a Latin root with the general meaning of 'that which has been spoken'. It gives its name to *fatalism*, the belief that events are fixed by fate. No human agency can ever change them. The future has already been written, just as if it were history, and history cannot be rewritten (though many have tried). Can't be helped...

However, we need to be careful before we shrug our shoulders and blame something that has gone wrong as 'fate' or 'destiny' or 'kismet'. Sometimes we can look back and admit that a poor outcome has been caused by a poor decision, or a poor choice, or a moment of negligence. These can be trespasses, because we all

#### know that:

If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. [1 John 1: 8-9 NIV]

Jesus urges us to use the prayer he wrote for us: Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

Jesus recommends this prayer to us because He knows that we will trespass. He knows what it is to be human and to be tempted:

The devil took [Jesus] to a very high mountain and showed him all kingdoms of the world and their splendour. 'All this I will give you,' [the devil] said, 'if you will bow down and worship me.' [Mt 4: 8-9 NIV]

The devil also knows something of humanity. We readily bow down before various gods - wealth,

the

power, self-gratification and fame come easily to mind. But Jesus showed us in the wilderness a lasting example of how to respond:

Jesus said to him, 'Away from me, Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God and serve him only.' [Mt 4:10 NIV]

As we approach Easter through the time of Lent, which celebrates Jesus's time in the wilderness, we should follow His example. Tell the devil to (I'm sure you'll pardon the expression...) go to Hell.

So 'fate' is only fatal if we allow it to be so. We have the strength and the opportunity to change things for the better in this Lenten time. And Jesus will help us if we but ask.

#### **Dining In**

Spring is approaching but it's still soup time, substantial soup, in our household. We like to try different recipes but the one that we always return to is the one that we're sharing today - red lentil, chickpea and chilli soup. It's easy to make, warms you up and will keep you full till dinnertime. This makes enough for 4 bowls.

#### **Ingredients:**

2 tsp cumin seeds 850ml veg stock or water Large pinch chilli flakes 400g tinned tomatoes 1 tbsp olive oil 200g chickpeas 1 red onion chopped small bunch coriander 140g red lentils

#### Method

- Heat a large saucepan and dry fry the cumin seed and chilli flakes for about 1 minute or until they start to jump around and release their aroma. Add the olive oil and onion to the pan and cook for 5 mins.
- 2. Stir in the lentils, stock and tomatoes, bring to the boil and then simmer for 15 mins until the lentils have softened.
- 3. Whizz with a stick blender or in a food processor until smooth, put it back in the pan and add the chickpeas. Heat gently and check the seasoning. Pour into bowls and serve with a dollop of yogurt and chopped coriander on the top.

If you have chickpeas left over (200g is only half a tin), why not make some hummus. Whizz them in a blender, add a spoonful of tahini, some lemon juice, and maybe some ground cumin. (I deliberately haven't given exact quantities – add them to your taste), season and whizz again until smooth-ish. And if you want to make other soup recipes more substantial, try adding a handful of




lentils. My favourite carrot soup recipe now has red lentils added to it. No red lentils in stock? Try adding a tin of baked beans and whizzing it up

### **Story of a Famous Hymn Amazing Grace**

This stirring hymn, 440 in *Singing the Faith*, is by John Newton (1725-1807). An interesting man to say the least. But let's look first at the famous opening verse (of six)

Amazing grace - how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me! I once was lost, but now am found, Was blind, but now I see.

Newton thinks of himself as 'a wretch' and the reason is not hard to find. He came from a seafaring family, brought up in Aveley, Essex. He joined the Royal Navy but left in dishonourable circumstances, only to become involved in the slave trade. Exposed to Christianity, he gradually realised that slavery was in his own words 'a stain of our national character' and became a staunch abolitionist. Eventually



Newton was ordained a priest in the CofE. He wrote and published *Amazing Grace* in 1779.

Newton's self-penned epitaph on his tomb at Olney (Bucks) records him as *once an infidel and libertine, a servant of slaves* but the culmination of his story shows that no-one is beyond redemption.

#### **A Final Image**

Probably the best-known work by US artist Edward Hopper (1882 –1967). Much of his work encourages the viewer to ask questions. What is the relationship between the couple at the centre of the composition? What feelings are projected by the view, rather hunched, of the lone customer? Why is is he drinking alone? What is the waiter saying?
