## From the Editor

Most people blessed with good eyesight enjoy a rainbow. I'm no exception, and over the years I've learned a little about rainbows.

Basically, and rather unromantically, a rainbow is an optical illusion that has no physical substance. It depends on white light being split ('refracted') and reflected, inside a drop of water, into seven constituent colours. In order for a rainbow to appear, three elements must be present, in the order shown:


The figure of $42^{\circ}$ deserves explanation, but space here is too tight. It's all about the refractive index of a raindrop. The proof of the pudding is that rainbows will typically occur at the start and end of the day, usually in spring or autumn, when the sun is low. So, what you see of a rainbow depends on where you stand. If the observer can see sunshine ahead and rain to one side, they see no rainbow.

In a much broader way, the way we see the world depends on where we stand. A beautiful rainbow symbolises a beautiful world. Anyone can see its beauty and its many colours if they are standing in the right place. If however they are in the wrong place, they may only see a rainstorm that symbolises conflict and strife.

As Christians, the Bible shows us where to stand in two simple instructions:

Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength [and...]

Love your neighbour as yourself. [Mark 12: 30-31]
So, our task is simple. We have to move ourselves and others to the right place. But who should we move - and how and where? Again scripture has the answer:

Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. [Mt 28: 19-20]

This is a big ask. Nobody is expected to do it alone. Even Jesus recruited a dozen people to help. At Highlands, we hope to recruit shortly an Intergenerational Mission Enabler (IME). Yes, it is a bit of a mouthful isn't it? Make sure your teeth are firmly fixed in place before you attempt it.

I hope to explain more in the next Highlander, but for now, I see the core of the IME job as being to move people, wherever
 they are and whatever age they are, into the right place. The task for the rest of us is to support him or her.

This is an example of a work featured on Poems on the Underground which has been doing exactly what it promises since 1986. You can find an archive at https://poemsontheunderground.org/. It is a brilliant idea, one of few bright spots of travel on the London tube.

Here we have a brief extract, celebrating springtime, from this beautiful poem. You need to read the entire work to appreciate fully its depth and emotion. It does get a bit
 steamy, but many modern scholars believe that the sexual relationship in the poem allegorises God's love for his people. If you're not up to speed with scriptural Hebrew, the King James Version is worth a try.

## from The Song of Solomon 2:10 [KJV]

My beloved spake and said unto me, 'Rise up, my Love, my fair one, and come away.

For lo, the winter is past, the rain is over, and gone.
The flowers appear on the earth, the time of the singing of birds is come, and the voice of the turtle is heard in our land.

The fig tree putteth forth her green figs, and the vines with the tender grape give a good smell.

Arise my love, my fair one, and come away.

## Dining In

Salmon en Croute
I was looking for something to make for a party as a non-meat option. This seemed to fit the bill as it was easy and turned out to be delicious. What's not to like?

## Ingredients

25 g unsalted butter
1 shallot, diced
2 minced garlic cloves
200 g baby spinach
100 g full fat cream cheese

50 g grated parmesan
2 tsp lemon juice
600 g salmon fillet, skinned
1 packet puff pastry
Egg to glaze

## Method

- Heat oven to $220^{\circ} \mathrm{C}, 200^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ fan
- Melt butter in frying pan and add shallot and garlic. Cook for 5 mins until softened but not brown.
- Stir in spinach and cook until it wilts completely, then cream cheese, parmesan and lemon juice. (I cooked this the day before and kept it in the fridge overnight.)
- When ready to cook, place the puff pastry on a baking sheet (I cheated and used ready-made - it was even rolled out for me).
- Put the creamed spinach on one half, leaving a $3 \mathrm{~cm}(11 / 4 \mathrm{in})$ gap from the edge. Put the salmon on top, flip over the other half of the pastry and seal the edges well with egg wash.
- (To avoid a soggy bottom, flip your parcel over so that the salmon is underneath the spinach).
- Brush the pastry all over with the egg wash and score the top of the pastry with a criss-cross pattern.
- Bake for 25 - 30 minutes until golden and crisp. Let stand for 510 mins and then slice and serve. Serves 4 as a main, 8 as part of a feast.

ECO Footnote: Salmon is one of the most intensively farmed fish, and the
farms cause environmental damage. So next time I cook this -soon - I'm going to use trout instead. The Marine Conservation Society promotes trout as a sustainable alternative to salmon. Give it a try.

## Interfaith and Labyrinths

This scores quite highly on my list of unexpected headings. However, I shall try to convince you that the two subjects belong together. I begin by pointing out a common denominator. That is to say Clive Johnson.

Clive you will know as a regular worshipper at Highlands. He is an interfaith minister and has, while remaining a leader of Christian worship, dedicated much of his life to research and understanding of mystical traditions of other faiths.

These can be quite mysterious. If ever you have occasion to visit the recycling centre at Stock Road, Southend, you will notice that the approach to the centre passes close to a Jewish cemetery. Here you will find a prominent notice that looks rather like this:


I have checked to see whether there are any significant differences in the orthodox and reformed rituals for burial. The only one that I can find is that the orthodox ritual requires special clothing for the deceased (for men, a tallis or prayer shawl), whereas the reformed ritual allows the deceased to wear his or her own clothing. This may be unfathomable to most of us, but, as in many other faiths, there is a perfectly logical explanation for what appears to be an illogical practice.

So it is that the wearing of a tallis compels the deceased to meet his

Maker with no trappings of worldly wealth or rank that might influence God's judgement upon him. And there are (to echo an old adage) no pockets in a tallis. Not so daft, then.

So that brings us around to labyrinths. Mostly we know this as a complicated irregular network of passages or paths through which it is difficult to find one's way. A labyrinth ${ }^{3}$ may therefore represent a spiritual journey through life with all its difficulties and show us how we might navigate through.

A famous labyrinth is the one at Chartres Cathedral in France, and many other labyrinths are based on it. This is its layout:

In his next presentation at Highlands, Clive will move on from his exploration of interfaith issues to lead us through a spiritual maze similar to this one.

Clive's previous sessions have been both inspiring and fascinating and this promises to be equally so. The session is from 1:30 pm on Saturday 4 May, but you must be there by $12: 45 \mathrm{pm}$ in order to get the session started on time.
