

That said, brothers and sisters... I spoke in our service on Sunday, 11 August about the story of the Pharisee and the tax collector.

[Luke 18 vv 9-14]. In the story, the Pharisee prayed to God that he was "not like other people – the evil doers". He did good deeds regularly and gave a tenth of his earnings.

The tax collector on the other hand could not even look up to the heavens. Instead he asked God to have mercy on him "a sinner". Yet



Jesus said that it would be the tax collector, not the Pharisee who would go home justified.

My message to us is this: let us not be the Pharisee and constantly bemoan the "evildoers". Instead let us ask ourselves,

'what part are we playing in a world that causes people to do such terrible acts of violence? How can we listen more to the cries of those who are marginalised? How can we spread the word of God to give hope? How can we speak to young people so that they know that they are truly loved, without having to prove success in an economically driven society?'

Mother Teresa said:

'People throughout the world may look different, or have a different religion, education or position, but they are all the same. They are all people to be loved. They are all hungry for love. God made us for greater



things: to be love and to be loved. What matters is that we love.'

So, my prayer for us all is that we pray together, whatever our faith, for each other to not separate ourselves from God's unfailing, everlasting and joyous love.

Praying in such a way is part of our Methodist Way of Life. I have plenty of resources about this and would love to speak to anyone who is interested. 



From the Editor

You may have been shocked, as I was, by the death of Graham Thorpe on 4 August. Before retiring he was a highly talented professional cricketer, who played precisely 100 test matches for England. In that time, he scored 16 test centuries, including a score of 200 against New



Zealand. Although at his death he had retired from playing cricket, he still had a career ahead of him in coaching, commentating and punditry.

This would be unremarkable but for two facts: firstly, he was only 55 years old and secondly, he took his own life. A spokesman for his family revealed that he had suffered severe mental illness during the last few months of his life. The family wanted this to be publicised as widely as possible with the aim of raising awareness of mental illness. I bring this story to you in that context.

However happy a person might seem with his life and career, this is no defence against, for example, a severe depression. It is therefore up to all of us to look out for the signs in friends and family.



But what, in fact, can (or should) an unqualified person do? The answer generally is 'not very much' - but it is a really important step to just succeed in getting a relative or friend to open up about how they feel. Anyone can do it.

Sometimes just to be a good listener is enough to make a difference. Taking a walk with a person is often a good way to get them talking.

If you think add a person is not safe by themselves (talking about harming themselves or worse) you might help them to call 999 for

an ambulance and stay with them, if you can. Or you could help them get to A&E. They may appreciate it if you can wait with them until they can see a doctor.

If they can keep themselves safe for a little while, they can get quick medical advice by contacting NHS 111, or make an emergency GP appointment to see a doctor soon, if at all possible. The emphasis is getting help as soon as you can. You could also suggest that they call Samaritans on 116123 to talk to someone, 24 hours a day.

Meanwhile, support them in prayer. And look out for yourself – it's OK to be not OK...

Though I have fallen, I will rise. Though I sit in darkness, the Lord will be my light. (Micah 7:8)



Puzzle of the Month²

A quick and simple one, with a bit of GCSE maths thrown in:

What is the square root of 0.44 recurring? (It's often written as above but with a dot over each of the fours. It just means that the 4 is repeated to infinity).

Some of you will be tempted to give up instantly. Don't do that. Here are two clues: (1) every recurring number can be written as a vulgar fraction. For example 0.11 recurring is better known as $^{1}/_{9}$. (2) to multiply fractions, multiply the top numbers – 'numerators' - together, then multiply the bottom numbers – 'denominators'. So $^{1}/_{2}$ x $^{1}/_{2}$ = $^{1}/_{4}$. Half of half is a quarter.



Poem of the Month William Shakespeare 1564-1616



This is arguably the best-known sonnet (poem of 14 lines – 4 quatrains and a couplet) in the English language. There is disagreement over the meaning of some lines, but I like the simplest explanations. For me, lines 2 to 6 say simply that the test of love is its stability and constancy in a world where everything else changes. In the words of St Paul 'Love ... always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres... never fails. [1 Corinthians 13 vv 6-8]

Sonnet 116

Let me not to the marriage of true minds
Admit impediments. Love is not love
Which alters when it alteration finds,
Or bends with the remover to remove:
O no! it is an ever-fixed mark
That looks on tempests and is never shaken;
It is the star to every wandering bark,
Whose worth's unknown, although his height be taken.
Love's not Time's fool, though rosy lips and cheeks
Within his bending sickle's compass come:
Love alters not with his brief hours and weeks,
But bears it out even to the edge of doom.
If this be error and upon me proved,
I never writ, nor no man ever loved.





Dining In Feta & Spinach Börek



A börek is what we might all have been munching if the Italians hadn't got there first with their pizzas. A börek is, like pizza, from the Med (Turkey, the Balkans, the Maghreb region of N Africa) with the difference that it is made, with pastry either closed like a top-crust pie, or open like a pizza. This example is open. It's also

vegetarian and can be produced from mainly FairTrade ingredients, which are worthwhile seeking out.

Ingredients

- 320g sheet of ready-rolled puff pastry
- 2 tbsp olive oil, plus extra for drizzling
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 200g spinach
- 2 eggs

- •25g parsley, finely chopped
- •2 tsp dried mint
- •1 tsp 'pul biber' ('mild chilli powder' will do)
- •200g feta cheese
- •1 tsp sesame seeds
- 1/4 tsp nigella seeds
- Drizzle of honey

Method

- 1. Take pastry out of fridge to come to room temperature. Also heat oven to 220°C/200°C/Gas 7.
- 2. Fry the onion in the olive oil 10-12 minutes until caramelised, then set aside on to plate
- 3. Wilt the spinach in the hot pan, then drain and chop when cool
- 4. Whisk the eggs in a bowl, setting aside 1 tbsp to later brush over the pastry. Add to the bowl the onion, spinach, parsley, mint and 'pul biber' then season with black pepper. Crumble in the cheese, mix well and set aside.

- 5. Unroll the pastry into the baking parchment that comes with it and cut into 4 rectangles. Score each portion along the outside, about 2cm/3/4 inch from the edge. Prick the centre with your fork a few times
- 6. Brush the edge of the pastry with the reserved eggs and sprinkle the seeds. Add the filling, divided into four, drizzle with olive oil and bake for 25 minutes until golden brown. Finally drizzle with honey and serve with salad.

Puzzle of the Month Solution

OK let's get rid of the decimal, which you'll remember is 0.4444...

Start off by multiplying by 10. Easy! $10 \times 0.444... = 4.444...$

Now we can find 9 x 0.444... The sum looks like this:

 $10 \times [our \ number] \ is$ 4.444... $1 \times [our \ number] \ is$ 0.444... So $9 \times [our \ number] \ must \ be$ 4.000...

and our number can be written as $\frac{4}{9}$, that is to say four-ninths.

A quick scrutiny of the fraction $^4/_9$ will reveal that top and bottom figures are perfect squares, of 2 and 3 respectively. So, let's just try out multiplying $^2/_3$ by itself. Yes! $^2/_3$ x $^2/_3$ is exactly $^4/_9$.

The answer to the puzzle is $^2/_3$ or if you prefer, 0.66 recurring. You're still a genius if you got it.
