<u>Remembrance Sunday - 10 November</u>






In Tirana, capital of Albania, recently I was surprised to find a British War Memorial in the City Park. Even more surprising, Captain (Rev) Gareth Banting was one of those listed. I did some research, and sure enough, Gareth Banting took holy orders after graduation from Cambridge, later becoming the much-liked chaplain of No. 2 Commando throughout their campaigns of

1943-1944.
After the battle at Sarande,
Albania, he was attending to the burial of both

British and German soldiers when he detonated an anti-personnel mine. He died while being carried to an aid post, on 10 October 1944, aged 32. So perhaps this Remembrance Sunday we should remember those who, like



Gareth, took part as non-combatants but shared the same deadly risks as the men and women they served.

In case this seems remote from Leigh on Sea, remember that Rev Hannah Bucke (recently of this circuit) currently serves as Chaplain to 4 Regiment Royal Logistics Corps.

November is men's health awareness month - now titled 'Movember' - where men may grow moustaches to increase awareness and get people talking



about men's mental health. Women generally are more likely than men to be diagnosed with common mental disorders, but men can also struggle with their mental health.



- 36% of all NHS referrals for psychological therapies are for men. Men are less likely to seek help for their mental health.
- 52% Would be concerned about taking time off work, whilst 46% would be embarrassed or ashamed to tell their employer. Suicide is the leading cause of death for men under the age of 50 in the UK.
- 12.5% of men in England have a mental health disorder.

In the letter to the Philippians 4:6-7, Paul says...

Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

How can **we**, this month, look out for men who may be struggling and offer comfort and prayer?

Begin by not assuming men are fine ~ let us make sure we ask after them, as so many mental health issues are hidden. We can visit

The peace of God passes all understanding and will guard hearts and minds – let us work and pray for that peace together as the Highlands Family.

From the Editor

In war, truth is the first casualty. Aeschylus. Athenian dramatist 525 BCE – 456 BCE

A few weeks ago Lesley and I had the pleasure of visiting the Italian Adriatic seaport of Bari, which I highly recommend as a place to visit. Arriving late, we chose the nearest place to our hotel to dine. This was basically a few tables in a small street in the Old Town. It was warm outside, and the place seemed popular with the locals – always a good sign. Seafood, orecchietta pasta and white wine were offered and we gladly ordered both.



At this point we met Christina.

There were no other tables available, and she asked if she could share a table with us and we readily agreed. She was dark-haired, in her mid-20s, slim and rather attractive (although I hesitate to say this for reasons that will very soon become clear),

The most distinctive thing about Christina was her attire. She was in fact wearing a black *schema*, together with a matching *apostolnik*. For those of you who do not frequent convents, this garb is usually known as a nun's habit, symbolic of repentance and simplicity. I thought at first that Christina had strayed from some sort of 'hen party', but as we conversed, the truth became clear. Christina really was (probably still is) a Russian Orthodox nun based at a convent in Montenegro. She just happened to be having a short holiday on her own in Italy.

She spoke excellent English, having studied at a UK university, and we politely engaged in small talk. However, it quickly became clear that there was an elephant in the room (or, more accurately, in the street). And the elephant's name was Vladimir.

Trying to work around the subject, I asked what sort of things she and her colleagues prayed for, across the water in Montenegro. Did they perhaps ask for peace? The answer I got was happily affirmative, but she followed it with a long and resolute explanation of how the Russian position was perfectly correct, and peace could only come if (and when) the Ukrainian government came to its senses and recognised this truth. She was reliably informed that Ukrainian soldiers were guilty of various atrocities, many of which were still continuing.

We were mildly taken aback. As a rule, I try not to argue with nuns. Furthermore, as I thought about it, as generously as I could, all that Christina was doing was following the line of the various news media to which she cared to and was allowed to pay attention. We on the other hand, raised on a diet of ITV and BBC news, had a very different view of the Ukrainian war and its causes. There was never going to be a consensus about this around our table in an Italian street. So, we said as kindly as we could that we would have to differ.

Christina (surprisingly) accepted my offer of a glass of limoncello and we parted as Christian friends. If only, I thought to myself later, the rest of the world could do the same. The problem, of course, is finding a news channel that is 100% reliable, 100% of the time. In fact, as it happens, Christina and I have exactly the same news channel available to us. Here is a recent update from just 2,000 years ago:

'You are a king, then!' said Pilate. Jesus answered, 'You say that I am a king. In fact, the reason I was born and came into the world is to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me.' [John 18:37 NIV]

Thomas said to him, 'Lord, .. how can we know the way?' Jesus answered: 'I am the way and the truth and the life.'

[John 14:5-6 (part) NIV]

Collections and Charity




Thank you to all who attended the **Macmillan Coffee Morning**, giving generously to the sum of £313.56 and having a really good friendly fun time.

Dining In Cheese & Broccoli Soup

It's that time of year when I crave soup – homemade soup especially. With a chunk of bread, there's

nothing better for lunch.

The usual soup I make is what I think of as virtuous – tomato, chickpeas and red lentil – but this week, with extra broccoli in the veg box and some end -of-date blue cheese in the shop, I found a recipe (serves 4) for broccoli and stilton soup that I thought I'd share.

2 tbsp vegetable oil

1 onion, finely chopped

1 stick celery, sliced

1 leek, sliced

1 medium potato, diced

Knob of butter
1 litre chicken or veg stock

1 head of broccoli

140g stilton or blue cheese

Method

- Heat oil in large saucepan, add onion and cook on medium heat for 5 mins until soft.
- Add celery, leek, potato and butter. Heat until butter has melted, pop the lid on the saucepan and sweat for 5 minutes.
- Pour in the chicken/veg stock and any chunky bits of stalk from the broccoli, then cook for 10-15 minutes until all the vegetables are soft.
- Add the rest of the broccoli, roughly chopped and cook for a further 5 minutes.
- Transfer to a blender (or use a stick blender) and blitz until smooth
- Stir in the crumbed cheese, allowing a few lumps to remain. You may need to gently heat the soup again at this stage.

As always, I think of recipes as a guide and as I didn't have any celery, I used half teaspoon of fennel seeds - this added a lovely flavour.




Ladies of Lavender is an evocative, heart-warming story of unfulfilled dreams and unrequited love.

In Aid of Church Funds

Contributing To Wildlife Conservation

A healthy and diverse wildlife preserves a stable biodiversity, ensureing that ecosystems can recover from disturbances and adapt to changes. Meanwhile conservation efforts can improve quality of life for communities that rely on their environment by promoting and showing sustainable use of natural resources. Many medicines are derived from plants and animals, so we must preserve access to these natural resources.

Wildlife habitats help to regulate the climate. Forests, wetlands, and oceans act as carbon sinks, absorbing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.

Lastly, we have a moral obligation to protect other species from extinction and to preserve the natural world for future generations. But how can we do it practically?



Individually it is a daunting challenge, but we can make a difference together;

- Install a nest box well before breeding season to provide a cosy retreat for small birds during cold winter nights.
- Prepare to support more birds next year.
- Clean bird feeders to prevent diseases spreading to winter migrants.
- Support conservation organisations though donations or volunteering.
- Join or organise cleanups in your community, such as beach, park, or roadside cleanups. This helps keep habitats clean and safe for wildlife.

If you have a garden, make it wildlife-friendly by planting native species, providing water sources, and avoiding pesticides.
