

From Your Minister

Dear Church family,

I am writing to you from my little study at home. The sun is shining, and it is bitterly cold outside, my dog Bessie is sat at my feet only because I have given her a treat; normally she lies in her bed under the piano. Dave is teaching at the moment, so maybe she has had enough of the same tune going round and round!

I wonder, do we sometimes get fed up with the same things going round and round? In our Covenant Service I talked about repetition and asked you to think of the things you do regularly in your prayer life and church life. I asked you to think



whether you might want to try something a little different like going on a prayer walk, meditating, learning scripture off by heart etc. There is comfort in doing the things that make us feel safe but in order to deepen their meaning we need to keep them fresh and remember their purpose.

At our service together on 28 January we are going to have a Love Feast and share some of our experiences in small groups in the church. There is no pressure to speak, but if you would like to join in and share how you are finding making these small changes, we can all help one another. Thinking about doing things a little differently and following on from our Church Council Meeting, we unanimously decided to take the path of growing our membership through Intergenerational Worship and Mission. This will reflect the age of our membership now, and of all the wonderful groups we have in our church on a daily basis. In order to get this off the ground we are making some exciting plans.

This will happen on our Mission Planning Day. We will be meeting at The Fishermen's Chapel (downstairs) and putting together a mission plan for the next 5 years. Lunch will be provided at a cost of £7 a head for fresh sandwiches, cake and teas/coffees from a local



business. There is paid parking directly opposite the chapel, I suggest car sharing. In the chapel all facilities including a disabled toilet are downstairs and are wheelchair accessible.

ALL are welcome, not just church members!

Mission Planning

Elsewhere you'll learn that the Church Council has opted to go down the route of growing our membership through Intergenerational Worship and Mission, and that planning for this begins now. This only works if everyone gets involved, according to their ability. Which is rather daunting.

You need to know that we plan to get some paid help - a Community Outreach Pastor (COP). Our COP will certainly not be able to make a difference single-handed. They will need me and you and everyone else to pitch in. To give an idea what this means, I have borrowed (and condensed) an article from Pastor Mike Webb the Rochford COP.

I have enjoyed my role. The members are friendly and keen to try

out new ideas. They run a lot of community activities and have strong community links, praying when needed. We have struggled to engage with slightly older children and families, so we have built an outreach plan of overlapping circles.

We have led school assemblies, sharing Faith with a large number of pupils who get to know what I am doing in the area and, I hope, some credibility as well. I have also been able to advertise events that we are running. I have kept assemblies light and fun and the busy teachers have appreciated it. The next circle has been to put on more targeted events such as a party and Christmas craft club. offering free craft, free pumpkins to carve and a free dinner. Families really liked this. We worried about low turnout, but publicity and

prayer overcame this. Responding to feedback. I hope to run a larger event every 6-8 weeks. These events rely on volunteers and need a hook of some sort - craft / games / talk / food. I am looking to start a Lego club in the new year.



The final circle is that of events in the church, remembering that the end goal is not to increase church attendance. Rather, it is to share the good news by bringing people to a place where they can hear the gospel message. There are many questions: can other activities like messy church be made available as well? Could these be run on a monthly basis at the weekend? How would these link with the bigger events? Or can a specific games night / families event be run on a monthly basis? We must keep our main work in focus, but keep praying for trust and friendship to build across all generations.



We pray for our friends who are ill, housebound, or bereaved and for those in residential care: particularly <u>Sheena Hunter</u> in <u>Westerley Methodist Care Home, Peggy Gosling</u> in <u>Westcliff Lodge</u> and <u>Joan Ford</u> in <u>Hope Green Care Home.</u> Our thoughts and prayers are with them and their families.

We **pray especially for** a number of church members afflicted by long-term illnesses and short-term accidents; may God grant in each case a speedy recovery. Especially we think of Andrew and Pauline Saville both undergoing long recoveries; also of Jean Barton recovering from a fall.

Sincere condolences for friends and families of Ron Crafer and Margaret Derby.

Ron Crafer

You may already have heard that Ron has died at the age of ninety-four. Nothing I could write could possibly do justice to Ron, but I shall have a go anyway. Ron was for many years Akela of 9th Leigh on Sea Cubs. I can't give a precise date for his retirement but it would be about 25-30 years ago. Even after that, Ron was available for some years to help out when needed. His speciality was his extensive collection of tall tales, any of which he would perform at the drop of a hat, keeping a troop of cubs spellbound. Ron's long service to the community was despite his responsibilities not only to his own family, but also to the retail ironmongery business that he owned and ran, then as now trading as 'Housebrite' on the London Road. He sold the business, and his house backing onto it, in Olive Avenue, in order to retire to a smaller property nearby, where he could grow superb flowers and vegetables.

In all his interests and endeavours his wife and co-worker Georgie was always with him, so we send to her our deepest condolences. Following a private committal, a celebration of Ron's life will be held at St Barnabas's Church SS7 2EJ at 3:00 pm on Wednesday 31 January. All are welcome.


Margaret Derby

From the Editor

The inspiration for these few words came when I was considering what I would talk about in the course of a launch event for my recent book¹


I decided that I would talk briefly in the event about what constitutes a 'story'. A story comes about typically from a sort of imbalance or tension between the characters around whom the story is to be built. Consider the 1945 movie *Brief Encounter*, which begins with one person content in a marriage relationship whereas the other is unhappy. Even with that brief description it's possible to see a number of ways in which the tension could resolve itself. I will not describe how the movie proceeds just in case there is somewhere someone who has never watched *Brief Encounter*.



Another example might be *The Lord of the Rings*. The characters are threatened by the existence of a ring which confers huge and malevolent power over its owner. At the beginning of the story, it is clear that the ring must be destroyed. Tension here lies in how that can be achieved. Again, I'll avoid a spoiler...

Great novels and films may involve multiple stories that weave together, either in series or parallel - which makes for a satisfying conclusion when all the loose ends fall into place. However real life does not always provide a nice, neat ending. Therefore, one of the



biggest hurdles a storyteller must clear is that of writing an ending.

A great example of a story is the one that US author Fulton Oursler (1893-1952) dubbed The Greatest Story Ever Told. You might know the title better as a 1965 Twentieth Century Fox blockbuster movie. Starring Max von Sydow and Charton Heston, it tells of the birth, life and death of a seemingly unimportant working-class Palestinian man who suffers oppression and injustice under a powerful and corrupt regime.

This may seem to be a modern story that is sadly familiar. But this story begins 2,000 years ago. What marks the protagonist is that He is Jesus Christ the Son of God, the Messiah that was promised by the prophet Isaiah 800 years earlier.

A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The Spirit of the Lord will rest on him [Isaiah 11: 1-2 NIV]

What is exceptional about this story is the ending. There isn't one! Not for the central character anyway. Jesus Christ is eternal and unchanging. As far as the rest of us are concerned, we must write our own ending, for which there are only two choices - a happy ending and a not-so-happy ending.

We can accept Jesus as saviour, and thereby choose eternal life: or we can reject him and choose death and oblivion.

End of story.

Dining In

This month's recipe is a new vegetarian chilli that I've just found. It's delicious and has become my new favourite chilli recipe. Do include the chocolate – it makes it soooo good.

Don't be put off by the long list of ingredients (and I always substitute if I haven't got the exact match!) This makes enough for about 8 people so there's plenty to freeze for later.

- 2 tbsp veg oil
- 2 onions, finely chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, chopped
- 2 yellow peppers, deseeded and chopped
- 2 jarred roasted red peppers, drained and chopped
- 15g fresh coriander, chop stalks, leaves left whole to serve
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 1 tsp ground coriander

- ¼ tsp ground cinnamon
- 2 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tbsp light brown soft sugar
- 1-2 tbsp chipotle paste (optional)
- 400g cans of black beans, kidney beans and cannellini beans
- 400g chopped tomatoes
- 300ml vegetable stock
- 20g dark chocolate
- 1. Heat oil in deep pan or casserole.
- 2. Fry onions with a pinch of salt until softened about 10 mins. Add garlic and peppers and cook for further 5 mins.
- 3. Mix in coriander stalk, spices, sugar and chipotle paste (if using). Cook for further 5 mins.
- 4. Add beans along with their liquid, tomatoes and stock. Season well and bring to a simmer
- 5. Leave to simmer on a low heat for about an hour until thickened/reduced. Stir in the dark chocolate and season to taste.

Story of a Famous Hymn

Eternal Father! Strong to Save.

This hymn is sung the world over by those who are journeying by sea. It is frequently used in congregational worship either as an intercession for someone known to be on the sea, or as a general petition for the safety of all seafarers. Very few hymns relating to the sea are found in our hymnal, and of these *Eternal Father! Strong to Save* is the most popular.

You can find the hymn at 517 in Singing the Faith, including its plaintive chorus:

O hear us when we cry to Thee for those in peril on the sea!

The traditional tune is named Melita. I expect that many of you will recognise that as a maritime and biblical reference. Melita was the Latin name for Malta, where St Paul was shipwrecked (Acts 27 and 28) in about 60 CE.



The hymn was written by William Whiting, who was born in London in 1825. At an early age he became Master of Choristers at St Mary's College, Winchester. He wrote several prose works besides this fine hymn. Although a sufferer from ill-health he was invariably cheerful and was gifted with a fund of ready humour. He died in 1878.

The hymn was written in 1860, although the final version, as we have it today, bears the date of 9 February 1875. This hymn is as familiar to British sailors as "Rule Britannia" and is invariably sung at services on board ship. A translation appears in the "Nouveau Livre Continue", the hymnal of the French Navy.

'When I turn the signal on, If it's working, let me know.' I hit the blinker and then I heard: 'Yes! No! Yes! No!'




Puzzle of the Month Solution
