Perhaps you would like to take the time to listen to John Lennon's song *Imagine*. Here are the lyrics to read and ponder...


Imagine there's no Heaven

Support Group for Parents of Children Not Attending School

Persistent absence in 2022-2023 in England (defined as missing more than 10% of lessons) was 17% in primary schools and 28% of secondary school pupils. That's about twice the pre-COVID level. This is, make no mistake, a huge problem. Our support group will not expect to solve the problem, but we hope we can make parents feel that they are not alone, and it's not anyone's fault.

The highlight perhaps was the Pearl Fishers' Duet, arranged from Bizet's opera and delivered by a duet of euphoniums - instruments that are said to resemble most closely the human voice.

I have great news. RB will return with a 'Sounds of Summer' concert (to take your mind off the election) on Saturday 22 June. As a bonus they will have special guests - the award winning and hugely popular 'Cantare', choir whose repertoire includes Nina Simone's Feeling Good, Duke

Ellington's It Don't Mean a Thing if it ain't Got That Swing and Say a Little Prayer, made famous by Dionne Warwick and Aretha Franklin.

RB promise something for everyone, from ELO and the Beatles to

1940s swing, marking the 80th anniversary of D-Day and the 200th anniversary of the founding of the RNLI.

The concert starts at 7:30 pm with doors opening at 7:00 pm. Tickets are £10 (£8 concessions). Those aged 15 and under are free, but must be accompanied. Please call (07939) 228052 to book your seats for an uplifting evening of summer sunshine.



Before that we have the Southend Symphony Orchestra ('SSO') concert on Saturday 8 June. Details last month. Tickets appear to be available only on line – from www.wegottickets.com. Just enter 'Southend' into the search box.

From the Editor



Is it possible that 'A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square' as the 1940 song suggests? Almost certainly not, I'm afraid However, to be fair, the songwriter² also refers in the song to 'magic abroad in the air' and 'angels dining at the Ritz' so we can extend some poetic licence here.

I'd hazard a guess that most of us have not heard a live nightingale. I say 'heard' and not 'seen' deliberately because there's nothing spectacular about their appearance and they are quite reclusive. The picture here is of a male. The female if anything is even plainer. It's all in the song.

Now, the nightingale spends the winter months in West Africa before migrating to temperate Europe (including southern Britain) and Asia. The boys arrive in the second half of April. They come about two weeks before the females, because nest-building is a male responsibility and must be completed when the females arrived. The males will then compete in trying to lure the females with the volume, variety, beauty and romance of their song. As soon as a mate is found, the males stop singing and get on with breeding. Some have compared this with human behaviour, but I couldn't possibly comment.

The song is a truly wonderful thing, full of whistles and whoops and at times a machine-gun delivery. The world record volume is an astonishing 93 decibels, taped next to a German *autobahn*. One can only assume that the male was trying to compete.

Where do I go to find a nightingale singing? We are fortunate in Essex

that we have one of the largest UK colonies of nightingales - about 30 to 40 pairs comprising about 1% of the total British population. They used to be more common, found for example in Belton Hills Woods. But numbers fell by 53% between 1995 and 2008, and Essex nightingales are confined to an EWT³ reserve at Fingringhoe, near Colchester. Too late this year, but I recommend you look ahead and find a date next April when you might go to hear, while you can, one of the most astonishing manifestations of nature within the county of Essex.

Our county is blessed with all kinds of wonderful sounds and images, some made by the hand of Man, but all by the grace of God. We tend to take them for granted, but what will our grandchildren think of us if we neglect and destroy their legacy?

As I write this, the announcement of a 4 July general election has just been made. It is no part of my brief to tell you how to vote. However, if you get the chance to question the candidates, find out what they know about wildlife in danger from overdevelopment and climate change; and what they propose to do about it.

Dining Out It's Picnic Time

Our picnic on Saturday July 13 is an EcoPicnic – everyone brings their own food, though swapping is not forbidden. So, what can I bring to the table (or rather, grass) that is tasty, healthy and easy?

The perfect answer is hummus. It's so easy to make that you really shouldn't have to buy a plastic pot of it. The basic hummus has four ingredients: chickpeas, tahini (pounded sesame seeds), garlic and lemon juice. To this is you can add spices (cumin is a popular choice), herbs or even other vegetables such as peppers or beetroot. In Egypt, hummus is often flavoured with cumin. Use it as a dip for your *crudités*⁵ or eat your hummus with flatbreads or pitta bread.

Ingredients

200g/7oz canned chickpeas
2 tbsp lemon juice or more
2 garlic cloves, crushed
2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
1 tsp ground cumin
2 pinch salt
2 tbsp tahini
4 tbsp water
2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
1 tsp paprika

Method

- 1. Drain the chickpeas and rinse. Reserve a few whole chickpeas for serving.
- 2. Combine the chickpeas, lemon juice, garlic, cumin, salt, tahini, and water in a food processor, and blend to a creamy purée.
- 3. Add more lemon juice, garlic, cumin or salt to taste. Turn out into a dinner plate and make smooth with the back of a spoon. Drizzle with extra virgin olive oil and scatter with the reserved chickpeas.
- 4. Sprinkle with paprika

Quick flatbreads can be made by combining 300g self-raising flour with $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp baking powder, 150g natural yoghurt, 1 tbsp veg oil, 2 tbsp water and 1 tbsp salt. Knead until smooth, roll out into saucer size and fry for 1-2 minutes.

Puzzle of the Month Solution

Time for some algebra:

- Let's say that Tarquin's age today is x
- So his dad Hannibal's age today is 3x...
- and dad's age in 12 years will be 3x + 12.
- In 12 years Tarquin's age will be x + 12
- And we can double that to find Hannibal's age, so...
- 2(x+12) = 3x + 12
- Let's multiply that out x + 24 = 3x + 12
- Then deduct 2x from each side 24 = x + 12

It's now clear that Tarquin's age today is 12. Happy birthday!

Of course, you could done it by trial and error. Well done if you did, but please note that skydiving may not be ideal for you.
